Qoqnoos Publishing House, one of the independent publishers in Iran, was founded in 1977 by Amir Hosseinzadegan. Since then it has published more than 1500 titles, including books from classic and contemporary world literature and Iranian literature to non-fiction books dealing with Iranian society and history, cultural studies and philosophy.

In 1989 Mr. Amir founded Qoqnoos Book Distribution Center to make his products easily available to the public. In 1998 he decided to publish children books, so Afarinegan Publication was founded by Amir's daughter and in 2005 Hila Publication was founded by Amir's son to publish Iranian novels and short stories; so Qoqnoos Publishing House transformed into a Publishing Group. Now this group publishes about 350 titles each year.

On the other side, despite the fact that Iran is not a member of the Bern Convention and Iranian publishers are not legally bound to observe copyright, it has been a long time since Qoqnoos Publishing Group voluntarily draws contracts with international publishers and copyright-holders in order to respect the intellectual rights of authors symbolically.

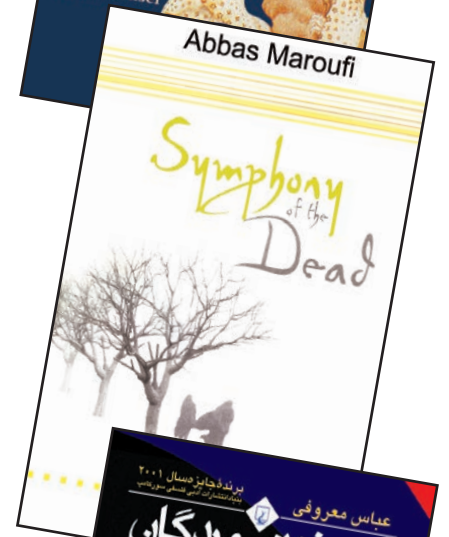
Human beings only live one half of their lives, I belonged to the first half and he, to the second half.

The Novel is a narrative concerned with tradition and modernism. It's a requiem for pain and grief in different layers of the society.

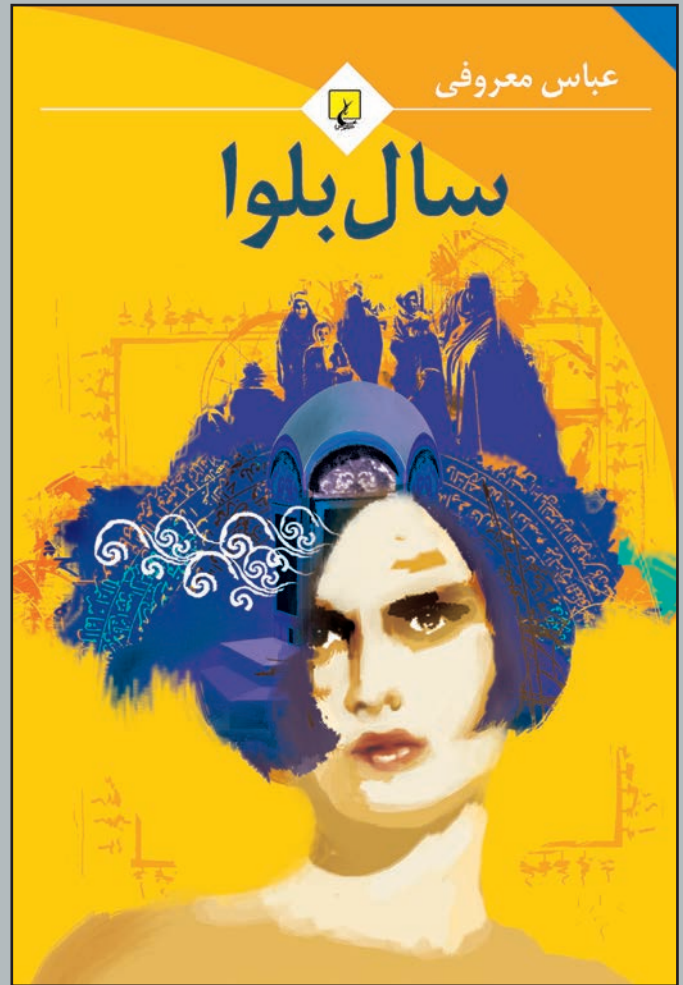

She has been a member of the board of judges for numerous literary festivals. She wrote also several flash fictions that are translated into Italian, English, Arabic and Georgian.

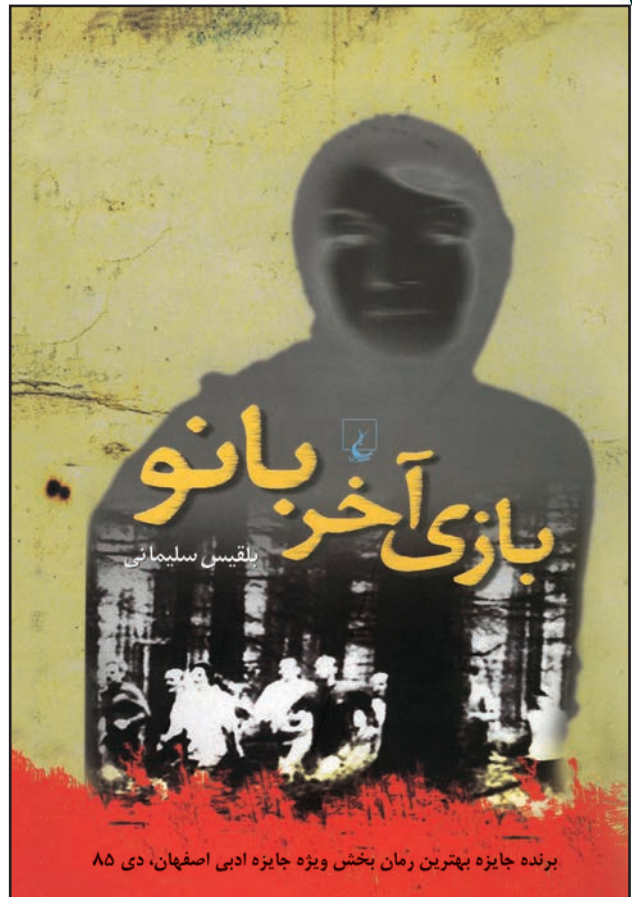

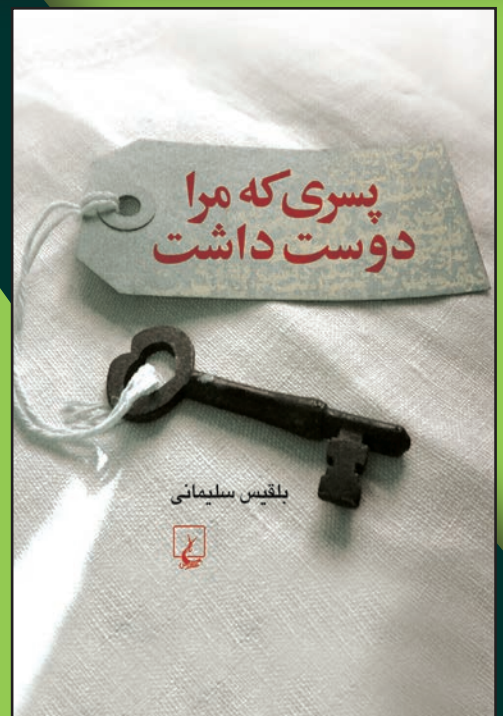

One comes to die, one comes to stay and one comes to refuse. The writer plays with political terms, takes a critical look at intellectuals in modern-day Iran and portrays their contradictory destiny in an environment which is anything but ideal.

Thanks in part to its psychoanalytical layers and boldness in sailing into uncharted waters, the novel has been a success in dealing with the world of women, a different world that has emerged on the back of a transformation: that of an eastern traditional woman to a modern one. So *Playing House* could be viewed as a book following a feministic, eastern approach.

The Boy Who Loved Me
Belqeis Soleimani's flash fictions are short stories that, in a page or two, make such deep impacts that long novels may be incapable of. They are among the most effective Iranian ones. The cold-blooded narrator recounts war and poverty in the simplest form. She talks about the killed people whose bodies are lost, showing no sign of sympathy. Using the minimum number of words, she makes a story out of a cheat, and in several lines transfers the sorrows of someone who is suffering from AIDS. The brevity of stories makes it easy to read them quickly, and the omnifarious subject matters are stunning.

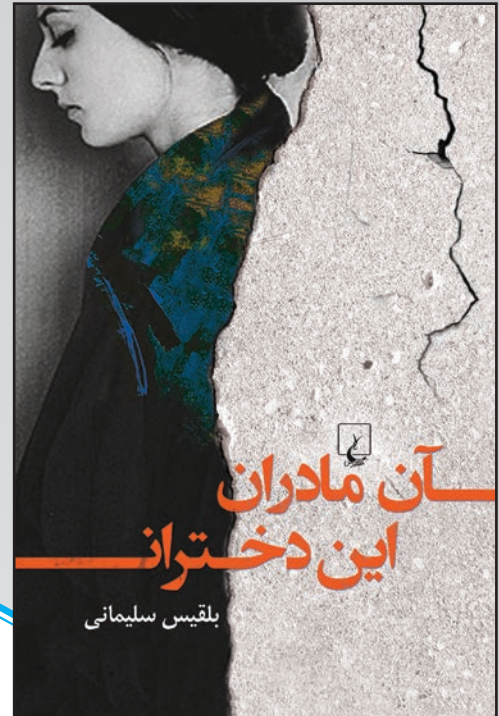

Another one is a writer and member of a political party who is accused of the murder of 17 women. And there are the Guardian, the Military man who is at times kind and sympathetic and at times cruel and violent, a man who does whatever he doesn't want to do and doesn't do whatever he intends to do. The writer dies in the middle of the story... The postmodern form of narration in this novel is quite special. The way writer uses punctuations and verbs cannot be seen in any other novel. Sometimes, the writer uses ellipsis to ask the reader to decide if there really happened a dialogue between the characters. All over the novel, the reader is invited to fill in the blanks. Several times, it happens that the reader is asked to delete part of the novel. Too many uses of the word "perhaps" is also an indication of the uncertainty of the novel's events. While it is about a decade that the writer has written this novel, it is still a popular work among the readers.

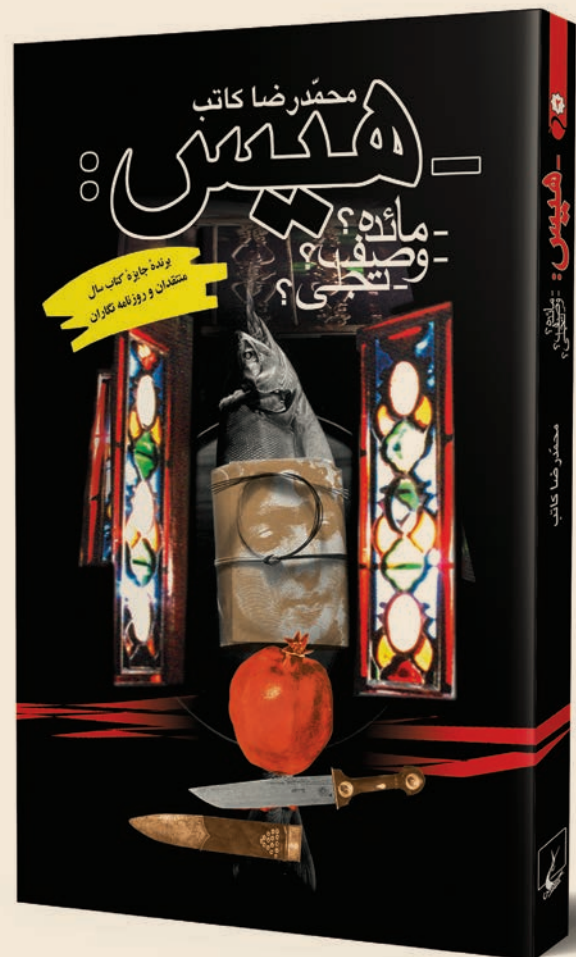

Start-up

Within the last ten years the novel writing in Iran has continued and expanded, especially with the entrance of under thirty five years old writers to the literary circle. The change in the number of published novels per year is intense: ten years ago the maximum number of novels published per year was around 200 titles, this has drastically changed to more than 500 titles per year. Both then and now, half of the published novels would be classified as literary novels and the second half as romances. But Iranian readers enjoy reading other genres as well, genres such as thriller, crime fiction, science fiction, fantasy and horror, although the novels in these last mentioned genres are translations from other languages, showing that Iranian writers have long forgotten about these genres.

Qoqnoos Publications Group has started a project to revive the forgotten genres. The project which is under the supervision of Mohammad Hassan Shamsavari, published four novels last year in different forgotten genres and received many positive feedbacks. It shall continue this year by publishing four new titles.

Shamsavari is a well-known writer in Iran who has won many awards during his literary profession. He is also one of the senior professors of creative writing in Iran with many students.

Zoha Kazemi, born in 1982 in Tehran, is an Iranian writer who has published many successful novels. She spent her teenage years in London, then returned to Tehran to start her career as a writer.

She continued her writing in speculative genres such as science fiction and fantasy. Her last novel *The Covering Soil* is one of the first Iranian novels written in the fantasy genre. She has also written and published a collection of science fiction novels which have been well received by young Iranian readers.

The story takes place in the Elamite era, three thousand years ago; the pre-Iranian civilization centered in the West and Southwest of what is now modern-day Iran, at the time when inner family marriage was common and the Shatens (monks) ruled over people's day to day life and cast their shadows on their after-lives.

Haltash, the young son of a passed farmer is madly in love with the girl whom his father took into his care after her father and brothers died. But Haltash's father does not allow them to marry; he wants Haltash to marry his sister. Haltash claims that his father withdrew his will at his death bed. It is now word against word. Her second novel, *Eternal Residence*, was the first work appearing in Qoqnoos's genre set.

One is a passenger who is about to emigrate and the other one is an airport taxi-driver. 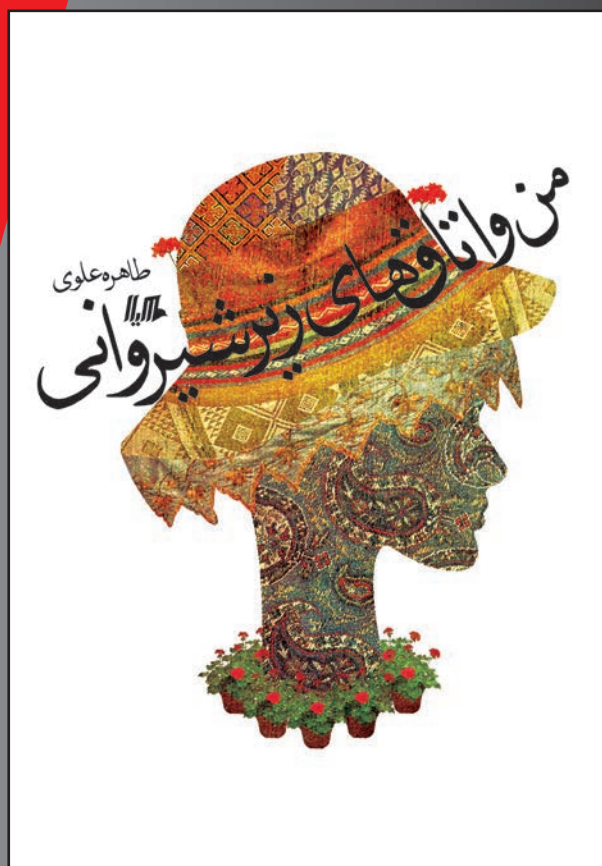

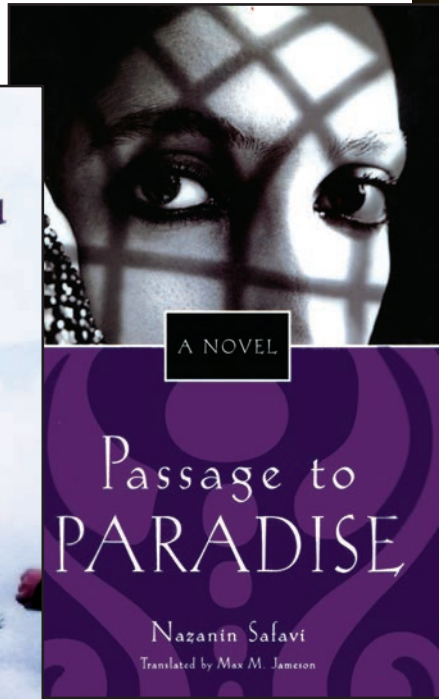
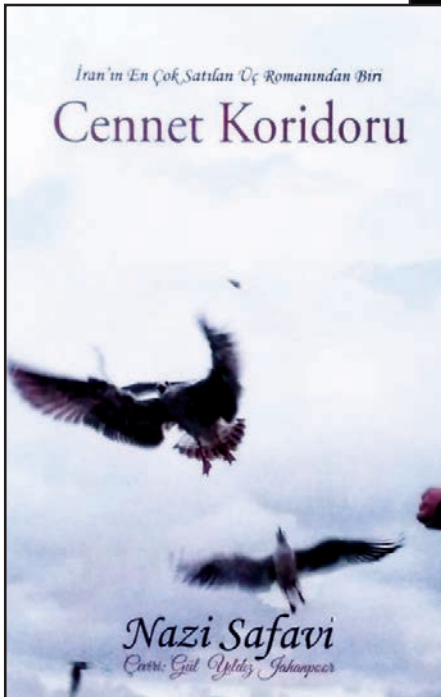

As Laya, Kamrouz Kiani's wife, returns home from Vancouver, the relationship among these friends faces some changes, but the personal alterations of these characters comes before the shift in their relationships. This Novel is the story of people's deep secrets. People who have private matters to themselves, matters they do not wish to share, but the truth will come out.

Feels Like It Is Not Me, Yasaman Khalilifard's third book, is about lives of people whose personalities have changed over time. These changes are so extreme that even these characters cannot recognize themselves. This Novel challenges people's selves, what they may not declare but are obsessed with. This attention to small details beside the modern story-telling makes the story very pleasant to the reader.

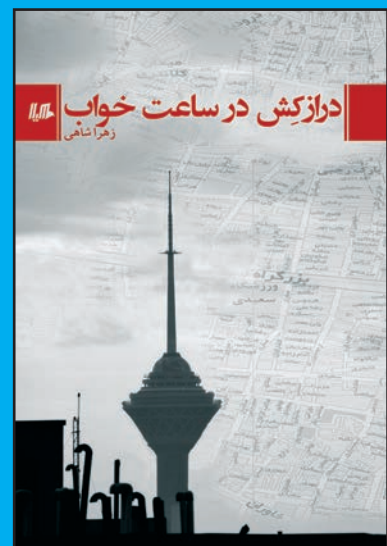

Bluer Than Sin

Winner of Best Persian Novel of the year of two Iranian book awards, **Mohammad Hosseini**, was born in 1972. *Bluer Than Sin*, a novel in ten chapters, centers on a young man who is arrested and interrogated for murder. The story of this 220-page novel is engaged with social-historical events of the past two decades in Iran. The novel illustrates these events as flashbacks through the narrator's memories. The narration starts with narrator as an eight-year-old girl, who, with her mother who is holding an Halva tray on her head and with her older sister, goes to the graveyard to visit her father's grave and hand out the Votive Halva for his peace, but this picture is a review of narrator's memories that had happened in her childhood; now she is a middle-aged woman and has four children. The social-historical events of the past forty years in this novel include the fire incident of cinema Rex in Abadan, executions before the revolution, the war and its tragic events, migrations from villages to towns, from small towns to big cities, from Tehran to overseas, refuge and its suffering, hopes and aspirations, happiness, love and separations in the life of these three women and the narrator's difficulty of living and growing her children in terms of migration to other cities due to war.
